EnCorps STEM program awarded \$50,000 grant

The EnCorps Science Technology Engineering and Math (STEM) Teachers Program has been awarded a \$50,000 grant from The Boeing Company. The money will support "Experts Enriching Classrooms," a program that helps STEM professionals and military veterans become STEM teachers.
